The purpose of the Excellence in Education Awards is to publicly recognize the sustained commitments and outstanding contributions made by staff, parents and/or community members in helping to create the best possible futures for South Slave students.

Brad Wilson was honoured for his dedication to both teaching and learning, as well as his willingness to pilot new ideas and projects in order to improve student achievement. He arrived at Deninu School in 2006 as a young teacher with limited classroom experience and has quickly matured into a teacher who incorporates exemplary practices in his regular classroom routine.

Volunteer Marny Twigge was recognized for her tireless and longstanding contribution to the schools in Hay River. Currently a member of the Diamond Jenness Parent Advisory Committee, Marny has donated her time and energies to students in Harry Camsell, Princess Alexandra and Diamond Jenness schools for many years.

## SOUTH SLAVE DIVISIONAL EDUCATION COUNCIL 2010 Excellence in Education - Educator Award Recipient Background

#### Brad Wilson - Teacher, Deninu School, Fort Resolution

Brad arrived at Deninu School in the fall of 2006 as a young teacher with limited classroom experiences but quickly engaged with school instructional leaders (such as the Literacy Coach), demonstrating traits of an exceptional teacher and learner. He has been described by peers as "a teacher immersed in learning", who is not afraid to try new ideas and projects in order to help his students succeed. As a dedicated learner himself, Brad collaborates very effectively with his colleagues and other professionals in an effort to internalize the best ideas, methods and strategies. He is respected both in the school and the community for his commitment to education and his students.

Brad's excellent organizational skills ensure he is always well prepared and his classroom is well managed. He has worked hard to successfully integrate key aspects and strategies of the SSDEC's Leadership for Literacy program into content and subject areas. For example, he recently demonstrated how he integrated the instructional elements of the Big 5 by using a Science unit about space travel to focus on further developing reading and writing skills. Colleagues have commented on how impressed they are with his focus on differentiation and on meeting the needs of all learners in his classroom through the gradual release of responsibility.

As well, Brad consistently uses data to drive his instruction and ensure he is meeting the needs of all of his students. He incorporates student assessment data such as CARS, attendance figures, classroom observations and regular assessments tools into his instructional planning and decision-making. His attention to individual and group ability and skill levels provides well-thought-out instruction across content areas.

Brad combines his use of data with a creativity that is truly unique. His combination of guided reading with book club provides learners with the opportunity for authentic follow-up from guided reading that is at each student's independent reading level. Also of note is that his classroom provided the only observed regional model of Leveled Literacy Intervention (LLI) delivered daily within the classroom. Creative and flexible scheduling allows the intervention worker and literacy coach to run LLI groups at the same time guided reading and independent reading takes place in the classroom. He has also developed a process whereby inconsistent attenders can track their own progress in Word Study, handing them more responsibility for their own learning.

In summary, Brad Wilson's attitude and commitment have transformed him very quickly from a rookie teacher in a new community to an educational leader who represents the kind of exemplary practice to which others aspire: one in which the needs of his students are at the forefront of his actions while he consistently demonstrates his own openness to learning.
